All Systems Connect International Symposium 2023 has been developed by The One For All Alliance and partners, to bring together changemakers from water, sanitation and hygiene, health, climate, economic development and social justice, to connect with purpose, work on collective solutions, and strengthen their capabilities as systems leaders.

The Symposium is borne out of a conviction that the challenges we face cannot be solved by the fragmented and siloed thinking of the past. The solutions are out there – they lie in strong, interconnected, national and local systems working in coordination together to deliver crucial public services.

The event is a determined intervention to change the way we all work: systems leaders, decision makers, experts and influencers. We'll exchange ideas and evidence-based lessons from success (and failure); stories of how people are achieving justice through systems strengthening; showcase how water, sanitation and hygiene services provide a gateway to justice; and share learning about how to design, implement, monitor and fund for greater scale and impact.





WASH Learning

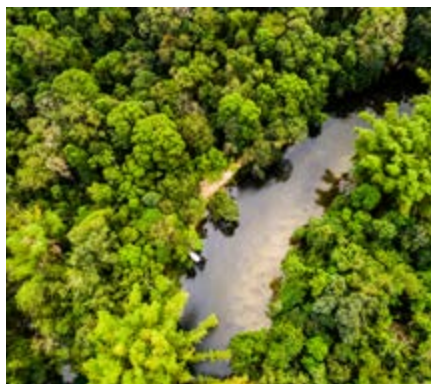

CONNECT Social Justice (C4)

Exchanging experiences, debating key issues and highlight actions to better value community agency and promote equality.

Societies are fundamentally unjust and access to power and resources – and services – remains divided by race, class, gender, nationality, and geography, both within and between countries. Because access to power, privilege is stacked in favour of wealthier, more powerful actors, special measures are needed to safeguard the rights of groups who are marginalised from access, and from meaningful participation and decision making.

Water, sanitation, and other public services are essential tools to combat poverty and inequality and therefore core to social justice. The theme will unpack the links between water, sanitation, climate, health, gender and economic justice, and how to build connected movements for change.

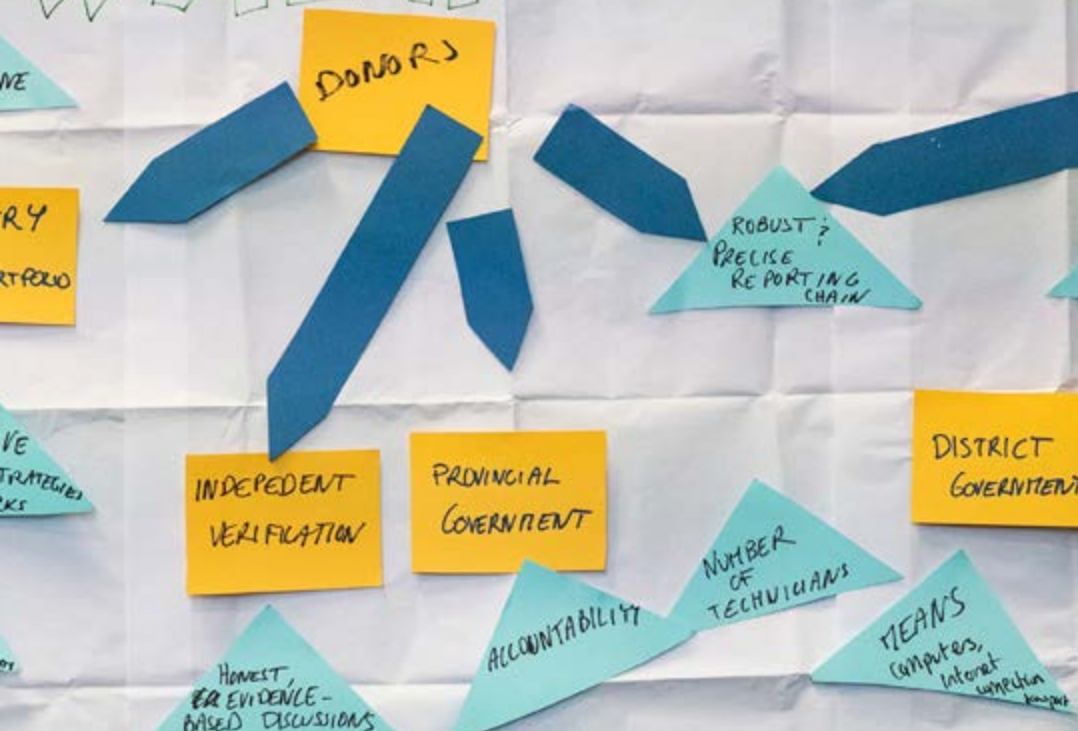

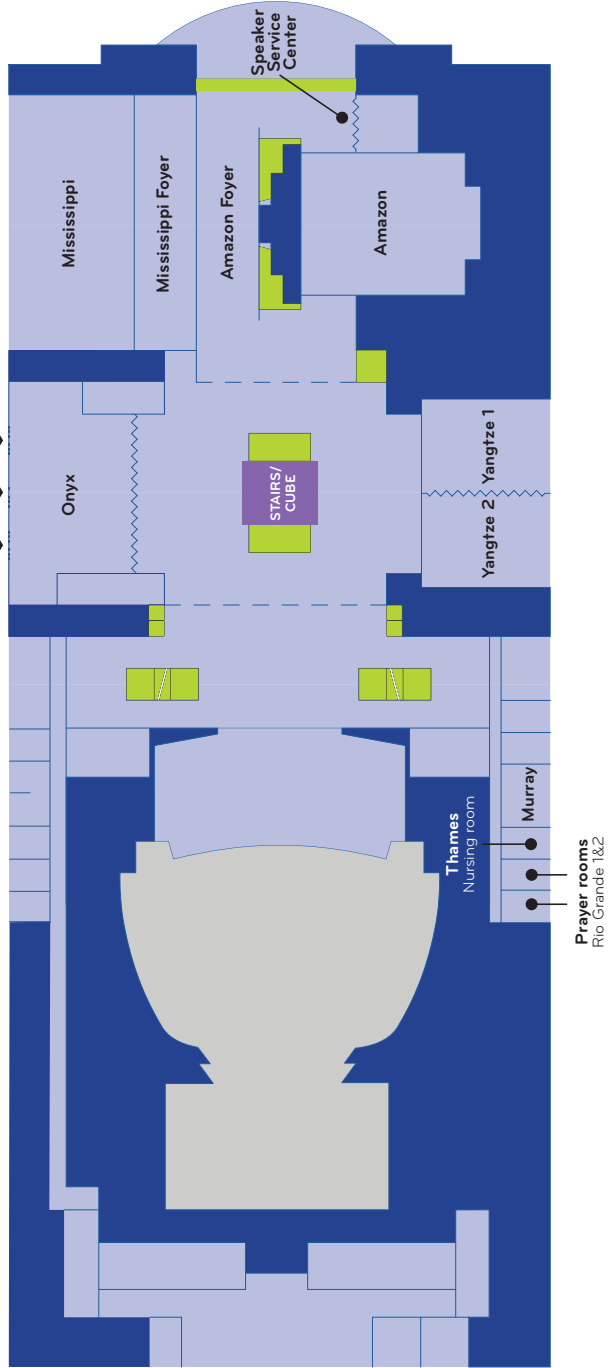
